



Desegregation Analysis

KIPP Delta Public Schools (KIPP Helena) is requesting an amendment authorizing it to: 1.) change the grade configurations of its elementary and middle schools in Helena-West Helena, and 2.) relocate its high school campus in Helena-West Helena to another location still within the Helena-West Helena School District (HWHSD). KIPP Helena will continue to comply with all applicable federal and state statutory and regulatory requirements regarding the creation and maintenance of desegregated public schools.

The granting of this amendment request to KIPP Helena should have no negative impact on the ability or the efforts of the HWHSD, or any other Arkansas public school districts, to comply with any existing court orders or statutory obligations to create and maintain a unitary system of desegregated public schools. The HWHSD has not submitted information to the Arkansas Department of Education (ADE) stating that it is a party to any active desegregation lawsuits. Based upon its careful review pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. §6-23-106, KIPP Helena does not believe that the granting of its requested amendment will hamper, delay or in any way negatively affect the desegregation efforts of the HWHSD.

KIPP Helena will continue to comply with all federal and state laws concerning enrollment in a public school and in particular those laws specified to enrollment in a public charter school. The 2016-2017 school year student population in all of KIPP's Helena campuses as maintained by the ADE Data Center is 927 students, of whom 867 (93.5% of the total student population) are African-American. The 2016-2017 school year student population of the HWHSD as maintained by the ADE Data Center is 1,391 students, of whom 1,313 (94.4% of the total student population) are African-American.

KIPP Helena realizes it cannot exclude any student that may wish to attend due to race, gender, ethnicity, or any other prohibited reason. No conclusion can be inferred or drawn against KIPP Helena that there exists any intent to continue to operate a public school, by way of this amendment request, or in practice, that has a purpose or intent to create a racially segregated public school or likewise impact other public schools.

Helena

I. INTRODUCTION

Kipp Delta of Helena/West Helena is an open-enrollment charter school located within the boundaries of the Helena/West Helena School District (HWHSD). The school is approved to serve grades kindergarten through twelve (K-12) with an enrollment cap of 1100 at the Helena/West Helena campus and 2310 combined for all campuses. Kipp Helena/West Helena is requesting to relocate its high school campus to another location within the HWSHD and to change its grade configurations for its elementary and middle schools.

II. STATUTORY REQUIREMENTS

Although Ark. Code Ann. § 6-23-106 requires the authorizer to carefully analyze the impact of any new proposed charter school on the efforts of public school districts to achieve and maintain unitary systems, it does not require the authorizer to conduct an analysis of proposed amendments to an existing charter. However, Ark. Code Ann. § 6-23-106(c) states that the State Board "shall not approve any ... act or any combination of acts that hampers, delays, or in any manner negatively affects the desegregation efforts of a public school district or public school districts in this state."

III. INFORMATION SUBMITTED BY THE APPLICANT AND THE AFFECTED SCHOOL DISTRICT

A desegregation analysis submitted by the charter school is attached as Exhibit A. To date, no desegregation-related opposition to the charter amendment has been received.

IV. DATA FROM THE DEPARTMENT

The October 1, 2016, enrollment for the traditional public school districts in Phillips County is as follows:

IV. ANALYSIS FROM THE DEPARTMENT

"Desegregation" is the process by which a school district eliminates, to the extent practicable, the lingering negative effects or "vestiges" of prior *de jure* (caused by official action) racial discrimination. The goal of a desegregation case with regard to assignment of students to schools is to "achieve a system of determining admission to the public schools on a non-racial basis." *Pasadena City Board of Education v. Spangler*, 427 U.S. 424, 435 (1976) (*quoting Brown v. Board of Education*, 349 U.S. 294, 300-301 (1955)).

The ADE is unaware of any active desegregation orders applicable to the Barton-Lexa, Helena/West-Helena, and Marvell-Elaine school districts, and no desegregation-related opposition was received from any of the affected school districts.

V. CONCLUSION

As stated above, Arkansas law does not allow the authorizer to approve any public charter school that "hampers, delays, or in any manner negatively affects the desegregation efforts" of a public school district. Ark. Code Ann. § 6-23-106(c). The Supreme Court noted in *Missouri v. Jenkins*, 515 U.S. 70, 115 (1995):

[I]n order to find unconstitutional segregation, we require that plaintiffs "prove all of the essential elements of *de jure* segregation -- that is, stated simply, a current condition of segregation resulting from *intentional state action directed specifically* to the [allegedly segregated] schools." *Keyes v. School Dist. No. 1, 413 U.S. 189, 205-206 (1973)* (emphasis added). "[T]he differentiating factor between *de jure* segregation and so-called *de facto*

segregation . . . is purpose or *intent* to segregate." *Id.,* at 208 (emphasis in original).

It is difficult to conclude, from data currently available, that the proposal of the charter school is motivated by an impermissible intent to segregate schools, or that approval would hamper, delay or negatively affect the desegregation efforts of the affected school districts.

Desegregation Analysis

KIPP Delta Public Schools (KIPP Helena) is requesting an amendment authorizing it to: 1.) change the grade configurations of its elementary and middle schools in Helena-West Helena, and 2.) relocate its high school campus in Helena-West Helena to another location still within the Helena-West Helena School District (HWHSD). KIPP Helena will continue to comply with all applicable federal and state statutory and regulatory requirements regarding the creation and maintenance of desegregated public schools.

The granting of this amendment request to KIPP Helena should have no negative impact on the ability or the efforts of the HWHSD, or any other Arkansas public school districts, to comply with any existing court orders or statutory obligations to create and maintain a unitary system of desegregated public schools. The HWHSD has not submitted information to the Arkansas Department of Education (ADE) stating that it is a party to any active desegregation lawsuits. Based upon its careful review pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. §6-23-106, KIPP Helena does not believe that the granting of its requested amendment will hamper, delay or in any way negatively affect the desegregation efforts of the HWHSD.

KIPP Helena will continue to comply with all federal and state laws concerning enrollment in a public school and in particular those laws specified to enrollment in a public charter school. The 2016-2017 school year student population in all of KIPP's Helena campuses as maintained by the ADE Data Center is 927 students, of whom 867 (93.5% of the total student population) are African-American. The 2016-2017 school year student population of the HWHSD as maintained by the ADE Data Center is 1,391 students, of whom 1,313 (94.4% of the total student population) are African-American.

KIPP Helena realizes it cannot exclude any student that may wish to attend due to race, gender, ethnicity, or any other prohibited reason. No conclusion can be inferred or drawn against KIPP Helena that there exists any intent to continue to operate a public school, by way of this amendment request, or in practice, that has a purpose or intent to create a racially segregated public school or likewise impact other public schools.





Rationale for Waiver

In order to expand course options for students and deploy staff in the most impactful way, Arkansas Connections Academy (ARCA) respectfully requests a waiver from teacher licensure requirements. Currently ARCA staff is not able to teach courses outside their licenses. Further, teachers may have licensure in an area but not a specific endorsement code. This waiver would enable us to utilize the licensed staff we have to offer an expanded set of courses for our students.

During last year's application process, ARCA requested a licensure waiver for teachers who were licensed in states other than Arkansas. This request is different in that all ARCA teachers will be licensed in Arkansas, but may teach the courses that ARCA school administration believes will be most

beneficial for students.

ARCA teachers will be subject to required state background checks and the Code of Ethics for Arkansas Educators. ARCA acknowledges licensure waivers do not apply to Special Education licensure requirements.



Desegregation Assurances

The Arkansas Virtual Academy is seeking an amendment to increase its enrollment cap, phased in over a period of time, to 3,000 students. The Arkansas Virtual Academy's administrative offices are located within the boundaries of the North Little Rock School District (NLRSD). As such, the Arkansas Virtual Academy offers this Desegregation Analysis in accordance with the requirements of Ark. Code Ann. §6-23-106 to carefully review the potential impact its operation with this amendment request would have upon the school districts of the state as a whole, to comply with court orders and statutory obligations to create and maintain a unitary system of desegregated schools, but with particular attention to the NLRSD, Little Rock School District (LRSD), and the Pulaski County Special School District (PCSSD). Arkansas Virtual Academy has substantiated that the LRSD and the NLRSD have been found by the federal District Court to be unitary in all respects of their school operations. PCSSD has been determined by the federal District Court to be unitary in all respects concerning inter-district student assignment. The importance of the attainment of unitary status of the LRSD and the NLRSD, and the status of PCSSD as unitary in the area of inter-district student assignment, is that those school districts have no further obligations to comply with court orders in these areas. Therefore, the granting of this amendment to Arkansas Virtual Academy's open-enrollment public school charter cannot be said to have a negative impact on the PCSSD, LRSD, and NLRSD's ability to comply with any District Court Orders or statutory obligations to create and maintain a unitary system of desegregated public schools.

Arkansas Virtual Academy draws students from many school districts across the state, as well as students who were formerly in private schools or were home schooled, with its on-line offerings. Arkansas Virtual Academy provides particular opportunities to children, who for any number of reasons, are not able to attend school in a traditional school district. Many of the students enrolled at Arkansas Virtual Academy, therefore, would not be able to attend a traditional school district. Because all public school districts in Arkansas from which Arkansas Virtual Academy draws students are unitary in student assignment or otherwise not under any court orders to desegregate, the granting of its amendment request can have no negative affect on the desegregation efforts of any public school district in this state. Arkansas Virtual Academy is an open-enrollment public charter school and, therefore, must admit all applicants that apply, unless there are more applicants than spaces, in which case Arkansas Virtual Academy must fill spaces according to a random, anonymous lottery. Therefore, Arkansas Virtual Academy cannot predict its future student demographics.

As of January 9, 2017, Arkansas Virtual Academy's student enrollment is comprised of 1,832 students of which 2% are Asian, 11% are African American, 2% are Hispanic, 1% are Native American and 84% are Caucasian. The total of 1,832 students would have no material impact on the racial composition of the public school districts in Arkansas, which currently contain 477,268 students per the ADE Data Center. According to the 2016-2017 enrollment figures as maintained by the ADE Data Center, the total enrollment of Arkansas Virtual Academy is slightly less than .004% of that number. According to the 2016-2017 school year enrollment figures as maintained by the ADE Data Center, the NLRSD has a total of 8,405 students, the LRSD has a total of 22,759 students, and the PCSSD has a total of 12,199 students. A new, fourth school district in Pulaski County has opened for the 2016-2017 school year- the Jacksonville North Pulaski School District (formerly part of the PCSSD) (JNPSD). The 2016-2017 enrollment figure for the JNPSD, as maintained by the ADE Data Center, is 3,927 students. The combined student population of the four (4) Pulaski County School Districts is 47,290 students. Arkansas Virtual Academy's student enrollment of 1,832 students is equal to approximately 3.9% of the combined student population of the four (4) Pulaski County School Districts. At its full enrollment of 3,000 students, if the amendment is granted, Arkansas Virtual Academy's student enrollment would be equal to approximately 6.3% of the current combined student population of the four (4) Pulaski

County School Districts. In 2010, LRSD filed a motion to enforce the 1989 Settlement Agreement in the Pulaski County School Desegregation Case. The federal District Court permitted the Pulaski County open-enrollment public charter schools to intervene to present their arguments against the motion. That motion contends that the operation of open-enrollment public charter schools within Pulaski County interferes with the "M-M Stipulation" and the "Magnet Stipulation" On January 17, 2013, the United States District Judge D.P. Marshall, Jr. denied LRSD's Motion in these words:

"To sum up, LRSD and Joshua's motions fail because, after considering the undisputed facts, and considering those that are disputed in LRSD and Joshua's favor, no reasonable fact finder could conclude that the State is in material breach of the parties' 1989 Settlement Agreement as to openenrollment charter schools in Pulaski County. The proof of any adverse effect beyond the margin on either the stipulation magnet schools or M-to-M transfers has not materialized. The cumulative effect of open-enrollment charter schools in Pulaski County on the stipulation magnet schools and M-to-M transfers has not, as a matter of law, substantially defeated the relevant purposes of the 1989 Settlement Agreement, the magnet stipulation or the M-to-M stipulation."

Little Rock School District, et al. v. North Little Rock School District et al., Lorene Joshua et al., Arkansas Virtual Academy, et al., Case No. 4:82-CV-866-DPM, U.S. District Court-Eastern Division of Arkansas Western Division, Document 4809, at page 29.

In January, 2014, Judge Marshall accepted a Settlement Agreement which effectively concluded the desegregation case. One of the provisions of the Settlement Agreement was the voluntary dismissal with prejudice of the LRSD's appeal to the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals concerning charter school issues. On August 21, 2014, Judge Marshall signed an order which gave final approval to the Settlement Agreement and released the LRSD and NLRSD from the case.

In conclusion, Arkansas Virtual Academy submits that upon the basis of its review, no court orders or statutory obligations affecting the PCSSD, LRSD and NLRSD or any other public school district prohibit the State's charter school authorizer from granting an increase in the enrollment cap of an open-enrollment public charter school which enrolls students statewide and whose administrative offices are located within the boundaries of the NLRSD.

SUBJECT: Desegregation Analysis of Amendment Request for Arkansas Virtual Academy

I. INTRODUCTION

Arkansas Virtual Academy is an open-enrollment charter school operating statewide with its offices located within the boundaries of the North Little Rock District. The school is approved to serve grades kindergarten through twelve (K-12) with an enrollment cap of 2,000. Arkansas Virtual Academy is requesting an enrollment cap increase from 2,000 to 3,000 students.

II. STATUTORY REQUIREMENTS

Although Ark. Code Ann. § 6-23-106 requires the authorizer to carefully analyze the impact of any new proposed charter school on the efforts of public school districts to achieve and maintain unitary systems, it does not require the authorizer to conduct an analysis of proposed amendments to an existing charter. However, Ark. Code Ann. § 6-23-106(c) states that the State Board "shall not approve any ... act or any combination of acts that hampers, delays, or in any manner negatively affects the desegregation efforts of a public school district or public school districts in this state."

III. INFORMATION SUBMITTED BY THE APPLICANT AND THE AFFECTED SCHOOL DISTRICT

A desegregation analysis submitted by the charter school is attached as Exhibit A. To date, no desegregation-related opposition to the charter amendment has been received.

IV. DATA FROM THE DEPARTMENT

The October 1, 2016, statewide enrollment compared to enrollment at Arkansas Virtual Academy is as follows:

IV. ANALYSIS FROM THE DEPARTMENT

"Desegregation" is the process by which a school district eliminates, to the extent practicable, the lingering negative effects or "vestiges" of prior *de jure* (caused by official action) racial discrimination. The goal of a desegregation case with regard to assignment of students to schools is to "achieve a system of determining admission to the public schools on a non-racial basis." *Pasadena City Board of Education v. Spangler*, 427 U.S. 424, 435 (1976) (*quoting Brown v. Board of Education*, 349 U.S. 294, 300-301 (1955)).

V. CONCLUSION

As stated above, Arkansas law does not allow the authorizer to approve any public charter school that "hampers, delays, or in any manner negatively affects the desegregation efforts" of a public school district. Ark. Code Ann. § 6-23-106(c). The Supreme Court noted in *Missouri v. Jenkins*, 515 U.S. 70, 115 (1995):

[I]n order to find unconstitutional segregation, we require that plaintiffs "prove all of the essential elements of *de jure* segregation -- that is, stated simply, a current condition of segregation resulting from *intentional state action directed specifically* to the [allegedly segregated] schools." *Keyes v. School Dist. No. 1*, 413 U.S. 189, 205-206 (1973) (emphasis added). "[T]he differentiating factor between *de jure* segregation and so-called *de facto* segregation . . . is purpose or *intent* to segregate." *Id.*, at 208 (emphasis in original).

It is difficult to conclude, from data currently available, that the proposal of the charter school is motivated by an impermissible intent to segregate schools, or that approval would hamper, delay or negatively affect the desegregation efforts of the affected school districts.

Desegregation Assurances

The Arkansas Virtual Academy is seeking an amendment to increase its enrollment cap, phased in over a period of time, to 3,000 students. The Arkansas Virtual Academy's administrative offices are located within the boundaries of the North Little Rock School District (NLRSD). As such, the Arkansas Virtual Academy offers this Desegregation Analysis in accordance with the requirements of Ark. Code Ann. §6-23-106 to carefully review the potential impact its operation with this amendment request would have upon the school districts of the state as a whole, to comply with court orders and statutory obligations to create and maintain a unitary system of desegregated schools, but with particular attention to the NLRSD, Little Rock School District (LRSD), and the Pulaski County Special School District (PCSSD). Arkansas Virtual Academy has substantiated that the LRSD and the NLRSD have been found by the federal District Court to be unitary in all respects of their school operations. PCSSD has been determined by the federal District Court to be unitary in all respects concerning inter-district student assignment. The importance of the attainment of unitary status of the LRSD and the NLRSD, and the status of PCSSD as unitary in the area of inter-district student assignment, is that those school districts have no further obligations to comply with court orders in these areas. Therefore, the granting of this amendment to Arkansas Virtual Academy's open-enrollment public school charter cannot be said to have a negative impact on the PCSSD, LRSD, and NLRSD's ability to comply with any District Court Orders or statutory obligations to create and maintain a unitary system of desegregated public schools.

Arkansas Virtual Academy draws students from many school districts across the state, as well as students who were formerly in private schools or were home schooled, with its on-line offerings. Arkansas Virtual Academy provides particular opportunities to children, who for any number of reasons, are not able to attend school in a traditional school district. Many of the students enrolled at Arkansas Virtual Academy, therefore, would not be able to attend a traditional school district. Because all public school districts in Arkansas from which Arkansas Virtual Academy draws students are unitary in student assignment or otherwise not under any court orders to desegregate, the granting of its amendment request can have no negative affect on the desegregation efforts of any public school district in this state. Arkansas Virtual Academy is an open-enrollment public charter school and, therefore, must admit all applicants that apply, unless there are more applicants than spaces, in which case Arkansas Virtual Academy must fill spaces according to a random, anonymous lottery. Therefore, Arkansas Virtual Academy cannot predict its future student demographics.

As of January 9, 2017, Arkansas Virtual Academy's student enrollment is comprised of 1,832 students of which 2% are Asian, 11% are African American, 2% are Hispanic, 1% are Native American and 84% are Caucasian. The total of 1,832 students would have no material impact on the racial composition of the public school districts in Arkansas, which currently contain 477,268 students per the ADE Data Center. According to the 2016-2017 enrollment figures as maintained by the ADE Data Center, the total enrollment of Arkansas Virtual Academy is slightly less than .004% of that number. According to the 2016-2017 school year enrollment figures as maintained by the ADE Data Center, the NLRSD has a total of 8,405 students, the LRSD has a total of 22,759 students, and the PCSSD has a total of 12,199 students. A new, fourth school district in Pulaski County has opened for the 2016-2017 school year- the Jacksonville North Pulaski School District (formerly part of the PCSSD) (JNPSD). The 2016-2017 enrollment figure for the JNPSD, as maintained by the ADE Data Center, is 3,927 students. The combined student population of the four (4) Pulaski County School Districts is 47,290 students. Arkansas Virtual Academy's student enrollment of 1,832 students is equal to approximately 3.9% of the combined student population of the four (4) Pulaski County School Districts. At its full enrollment of 3,000 students, if the amendment is granted, Arkansas Virtual Academy's student enrollment would be equal to approximately 6.3% of the current combined student population of the four (4) Pulaski

County School Districts. In 2010, LRSD filed a motion to enforce the 1989 Settlement Agreement in the Pulaski County School Desegregation Case. The federal District Court permitted the Pulaski County open-enrollment public charter schools to intervene to present their arguments against the motion. That motion contends that the operation of open-enrollment public charter schools within Pulaski County interferes with the "M-M Stipulation" and the "Magnet Stipulation" On January 17, 2013, the United States District Judge D.P. Marshall, Jr. denied LRSD's Motion in these words:

"To sum up, LRSD and Joshua's motions fail because, after considering the undisputed facts, and considering those that are disputed in LRSD and Joshua's favor, no reasonable fact finder could conclude that the State is in material breach of the parties' 1989 Settlement Agreement as to openenrollment charter schools in Pulaski County. The proof of any adverse effect beyond the margin on either the stipulation magnet schools or M-to-M transfers has not materialized. The cumulative effect of open-enrollment charter schools in Pulaski County on the stipulation magnet schools and M-to-M transfers has not, as a matter of law, substantially defeated the relevant purposes of the 1989 Settlement Agreement, the magnet stipulation or the M-to-M stipulation."




Persistence Grades 3-8 and High School



- Pre-enrollment Parent Information Session:
 - 100% of new, enrolling families have completed the pre-enrollment session
- Summer SS Support for new families:
 - Contacted 1,440 families twice during the summer
 - Worked through Strong Start support list:
 - Begin building relationships with families, provide a point of contact for questions even before school starts
 - Ensure families have internet connection, adequate computer access, can access the school platforms, provide training as needed
 - Review policies, such as Learning Coach role/availability, Class Connect expectations/access, logging in and school attendance
 - Assist, as needed, in planning school space and schedules, especially in multi-child families
 - Orientation sessions, confirm completion of Welcome to Online Learning course
- Modified SS Support for returning families who struggled previously:
 - (in addition to above) discussed struggles the family had during the previous school year and set plans for success
 - Assisted families in:
 - setting a schedule, considering family needs/extracurricular activities
 - organizing work space, ensuring access to needed supplies
 - setting SMART goals





- Face-to-face Summer Connection Days:
 - 6 face-to-face park day family connection/training events across the state in summer 2016
- Tiered support via Family Academic Support Team (FAST):
 - 13.58% of enrolled students have been/are being supported by the FASTeam this school year.
 - 215 are active referrals.
 - 88% of all referrals (11% of student population since Aug. 15) have been referred for engagement/training support, provided by Engagement Coaches (EC). ECs provide supplemental support to students and families on as-needed basis throughout the school year. Teachers may select students for this support for various reasons (see below). ECs work with families to help them understand our school's policies, the roles of the parent, student, and teacher, understanding/using the school platforms, tracking student performance, building a schedule that works for the student/family, managing multiple students, engaging students at home, how to be an effective learning coach, and effectively communicating with their teacher. ECs check in weekly (or more often as needed) with assigned families online and/or on the phone, provide additional trainings in areas of need, and act as a liaison for the families.





- Tiered support via Family Academic Support Team (FAST) (continued):
 - 43% of all referrals (6% of student population since Aug. 15) have been referred for Truancy support, provided by the Family Compliancy Liaison (FACL)/Truancy Officer. Truancy support is provided through the FACL by reviewing attendance data and conferring with admin, contacting families to ensure they understand attendance requirements, assisting with logging attendance, attending court dates as needed, and following up with withdrawn students to ensure students are enrolled elsewhere.
 - 14% of all referrals (2% of student population since Aug. 15) have been referred for support, provided by our Family Resource Coordinator (FRC). The FRC ensures that students and families in crisis have access to resources, such as outside counseling, reduced internet providers, offering home/health care/personal supplies through a cooperative relationship with the United Way, support/training for families, teachers, and staff in relation to child welfare and suicide prevention, and working as the liaison with students placed in behavioral care facilities.





- Outings/Student Enrichment from 15/16:
 - ARVA hosted approximately 20 face-to-face outings during *SY 2015/2016* across the state with a total of approximately 750 students and families in attendance.
 - ARVA Booster families hosted 43 additional outings during SY 2015-2016 across the state through the Booster program with a total of approximately 720 students and families in attendance.
 - For SY 2016/2017, ARVA has already hosted 11 outings across the state with a total of approximately 300 students and families in attendance.
 - ARVA Booster families have hosted 13 outings so far across the state with more upcoming outings scheduled.
