PROCEEDINGS
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Good morning. Welcome to the July 19th meeting of the Charter Authorizing Panel. I'd like to call the meeting to order and welcome everyone to the Arkansas Department of Education. I would ask at this time that you please silence all electronic devices.

This panel will -- this panel oversees the authorization, renewal, revision, and revocation of charters, and it is our goal to facilitate a fair and responsible hearing. I'll ask that each person coming to the microphone, please speak clearly into the microphone, state your name, and title for the record. As you continue to talk, I would ask that you continue to speak into the microphone for the benefit of this panel, as well as our viewing audience that is watching us today via live streaming.

This meeting is being live-streamed and recorded, and our court reporter, Ms. Tiffanie Harrison, is here today to develop a transcript of this meeting, which will also be posted on the Arkansas Department of Ed. website.

REPORT-1: CHAIR'S REPORT

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: So, good morning. And Ms. Alexandra -- Ms. Boyd you are recognized to get us started this morning. I don't have a chairs report. Does anyone have a report? Then we'll start with you.

REPORT-2: CHARTER SCHOOLS UNIT REPORT
MS. BOYD: Thank you, Madam Chair. Just really quickly -- well, if you guys can handle this question, we can take care of it right now. We have 10 applications for open enrollment charter schools, which will be heard next month in August. Currently, we only have two dates for hearing on the August calendar, and so we would like to add a date so that only about three applications will be heard a day. In addition, we also will have some amendment requests, but they shouldn't be too long.

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Is your recommendation -we have currently August 16 th and 17 th on the calendar. Is your recommendation to add Tuesday or Friday?

MS. BOYD: I don't have a recommendation. Either works for us. Whatever makes sense for the calendar.

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Dr. Pfeffer?
DR. PFEFFER: I would recommend Tuesday be added.

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: August 15th?
DR. PFEFFER: Yes.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: All in agreement? Okay. If you'll add August the 15th.

MS. BOYD: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: And I'm assuming that they will start at $8: 30$ as well?

MS. BOYD: Yes, ma'am.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: All right.

passed.

## ACTION AGENDA

A-1: REQUEST FOR OPEN ENROLLMENT CHARTER SCHOOL AMENDMENT: KIPP DELTA PUBLIC SCHOOLS

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Okay. Ms. Perry, you ready for Action Agenda Item 1, Request for Open Enrollment Charter School Amendment from KIPP Delta Public Schools.

MS. VIRGINIA PERRY: Good morning. Virginia Perry, Program Director with the ADE Charter Unit. The first item on the action agenda comes from KIPP Delta Public Schools. It's an amendment request, and on behalf of the school we have Scott Shirey, the Executive Director here to speak today.

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Ms. Davis, if you will give us our process.

MS. DAVIS: Good morning. Jennifer Davis, Staff Attorney for the Department. The procedures you're going to follow for both action items today will be that all persons wishing to provide any testimony to you will need to be sworn in, with the exception of attorney.

The applicant will have 20 minutes to make its presentation to you for amendment, followed collectively by 20 minutes for any opposition that
there may be. The applicant will then have an additional five minutes to address any concerns or questions that arose. You can then ask any questions of the applicant, the Department, or anyone who you feel may have the answers that you need, and you can take the matter under advisement, or vote on it today. If you vote on it today, you do have a Google Doc that you can state your reason for your vote. And just a reminder that any -- because this is kind of considered a contract negotiation, anything that the applicant agrees to, or states verbally, that is different than what's in their presentation, or their written materials, does become part of any amendment that you may grant.

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Thank you, Ms. Davis. If all the representatives from KIPP Delta Public Schools will please stand, and anyone speaking in opposition raise your right hand. Do you swear or affirm that the testimony you're about to give shall be the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth?

REPRESENTATIVES (Collectively): I do.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Good morning, Mr. Shirey. MR. SHIREY: Good morning.

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: You may state your full
name and title for the record, and you may begin. MR. SHIREY: Scott Shirey, Executive Director, KIPP Delta Public Schools, and good morning, Chairman Coffman and members of the Board. I do have a PowerPoint, which I don't know if it's on the screen or up for -- oh, there we go. So, you can see our requests are laid out there. Number one, to increase our enrollment cap in Blytheville from 810 students, that's across nine grades, to 1,110 students starting in the 2018-2019 school year.

Increase our grades served in Blytheville from 4-12 to $\mathrm{K}-12$, starting in 2018-19 school year. And we're going to ask for some flexibility on how we phase in. I'll talk about that in a minute.

And then reconfigure KIPP Blytheville College Preparatory School, to serve grades K-6 starting in the 2018-2019 school year. And I'll sort of go through all of this, and give the rationale, and hopefully you can get the vision and we'll go from there.

So, right now in our Blytheville School System this upcoming school year, we had a 4-6 campus and a 7-12 campus, so that's the reason 2018-2019, we'd like to go into a $\mathrm{K}-6,7-12$ model, and basically grow our elementary program to include those younger
grades. Obviously, having 4-12 we want to make sure we have the complete system for our students and families, and having students at the lowest levels, helps us complete that picture. Furthermore, we know high schools are expensive to run; more than elementary, so making sure we have the full model in place.

You can see on the next slide the one possible idea would be -- for next year, would be K -1 in 20182019, K-2, 2019-2020, and then following $\mathrm{K}-3$. This is why we're asking for the opportunity to expand to K-3, but to have flexibility in terms of what's the best way to get there. And, obviously, we would want to communicate that well in advance to the Blytheville School District. We can circle back to that. I'm sure there will be a few questions there.

Just in terms of achievement data, I think we're doing okay. I'd like to do better, but as you can see from the next couple of slides, we are consistently outperforming the Blytheville School District, and obviously our demographics are most closely matched to the Blytheville School District, in terms of poverty, in terms of race, and just in terms of the population. Most of our students in that area are from the Blytheville School District.

So, you can see the comparisons at the district level, outperforming them in everything, with the exception of writing, and you can also see school by school. Although it's not apples to apples, we consistently outperform them.

A couple of other highlights, beyond just the test scores, we're really proud this year. You can see -- what this is is a picture of a mural design that our students drew up, and they were selected across all the KIPP schools, 200 across the country, to go to Las Vegas and do this mural, actually the first week in August. So, it's a really cool experience. They going to go paint this gigantic mural, and again, they competed against students from 200 schools across the KIPP network and this was the mural design that was chosen. So, beyond the academic staff, there's some really exciting things happening in Blytheville.

One other exciting bit of news from Blytheville, there's one of our juniors who actually has our first 36, perfect ACT score, so we're really proud of that accomplishment.

Getting back to sort of the design, currently -we had the opportunity to purchase a school building from the Blytheville School District a couple of
years ago. We renovated part of it, about 63,000 square feet. We renovated part of it, the part that is not circled. The part that is circled has not been renovated yet, so that's additional space that will allow us to have a media center, additional classrooms for this expansion, and that makes more sense than us just building new buildings. And obviously, like I said, we purchased that from the Blytheville School District. It was a building they weren't using, or were no longer going to use, so it's a good use of resources in the community.

In order to -- and these are just some more close-ups, and then the campus location. In order to do that, there's a couple of other pieces on the financial end. We're actually seeking approval for 10.6 million dollars in loans through New Market Tax Credits. That's why we're here earlier than usual. Usually we come in October or February, asking for those expansions of upgrades, but given this incredible opportunity, this deal will allow us to fully renovate the central campus, and then construct a construction for a multipurpose campus on our 7-12. It's all modular, as we'd like to put in a gymnasium, or stage, just some permanent facility.

So, combined with the USDA loan -- and I'll try
to break this down a little bit. You have a letter in front of you, which explains it pretty well, so I actually can point you to that right now. Ms. Boyd passed this out. It's probably the best explanation. I'd like to read the first couple of paragraphs. We're seeking to approve 10.6 million dollars in loans from New Market Tax Credits. In order to do this, it's a partnership through Hope Enterprise Corporation. We'll have a 99-year lease with KIPP Delta Development Organization for this deal.

Next paragraph, these loans and real estate transactions will allow KIPP Delta's Blytheville Arkansas campus to be fully renovated for the construction of a hardened multipurpose building on its high school campus. The renovations at Central, our elementary campus, will allow KIPP Delta to serve students in grades kindergarten through sixth. So those are the big pieces there.

If you skip down to the third paragraph, in 2016 the United States Department of Agriculture awarded KIPP Delta Community Facilities loan obligation in the amount of nearly 10 million dollars for a term of 40 years, at a fixed interest rate of 2.75 percent. So, we thought we couldn't get any better than that, 2.75 percent over 40 years is pretty fantastic;
however, when you mix this with a New Market Tax Credit opportunity -- and if you go down to the last paragraph on that page, you can see the benefits to KIPP Delta, and the students are pretty incredible. We expect to save an additional 3.7 million dollars in debt service payments, over the period, utilizing the New Market Tax Credit Program, in conjunction with the USDA loan.

So, just to put this all in perspective, if we were to go to a traditional bank -- at the six percent loan, we're actually saving close to 10 million dollars just through the USDA deal over 40 years. When you add the New Market Tax Credit in, there is an additional savings of 3.7 million. So, this is an opportunity that came to us, and partly because of that opportunity, and because we wanted to expand, we said this is a great time to take advantage of it and belt out our Blytheville campus to make sure we have the capacity to serve $\mathrm{K}-12$ at a very reasonable rate, which means that less of our money will go into facilities, and more of our money will go into students and programming.

I know that's a high-level summary. We did submit this for approval through the Commissioner. It was approved, as you can see on the next page.

So, that approval has been taken care of. And, obviously, to take advantage of this opportunity, we would -- we are seeking approval from the Board to have permission to expand to those grades $\mathrm{K}-3$. We sort of walked through this page already with the New Market Tax Credit Program overview, and how it works. I know it's very technical, so $I$ won't bore you with all of that, unless there are specific questions, and I'll do my best to answer all of those.

In summary, the big plan is we have two campuses in Blytheville. We'd like the elementary campus to serve K-6. We'd like the high school campus to serve 7-12. We have a plan to utilize USDA and New Market Tax Credits, so we have proper facilities for our students. Our academic scores are okay. We can get better. We are still outperforming again, our peers, but I think this opportunity will allow us to do better, and giving our kids good -- our kids a stable home.

And again, just to be clear, the flexibility we are requesting is that you give us permission to expand to $\mathrm{K}-3$, except grant us a little bit of flexibility in terms of how we phase in, over the next two to three years, with the condition that we communicate to the Blytheville School District in an
appropriate amount of time.
In other words, if we're doing $\mathrm{K}-1$ next year, let them now in March that we're doing $K-1$. If we end up, because of leadership, having to -- or, because of great leadership, if we're going to do $\mathrm{K}-3$ all at once, let them know. Or just do third grade -- depends on leadership. Again, we're here a little earlier than expected, so we can get the New Market Tax Credit deal passed through.

So, that was a mouthful, and I'll pause for questions, and we can dive in deeper on any areas. I appreciate you taking the time to listen to us today.

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Thank you, Mr. Shirey. Ms. Davis, is there anyone here to speak in opposition? Mr. Shirey, do you have any final words before we begin questions and answers?

MR. SHIREY: No, thank you.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: All right. Dr. Saunders?
DR. SAUNDERS: Yeah, could you -- I wasn't real clear. So, on the expansion of the grades, that's not determined how that would look yet; did I understand that correctly? That you would determine that internally later?

MR. SHIREY: Yeah. So, currently our -actually, I'll show you on this. So, currently in
this building, I don't know if you can see the laser, but the parts that aren't blue, we'd taken advantage of for our 4-6. We have one leader in that building with 4-6. We are currently looking for an exceptional school leader, who will help us grow down, or complete that. So, depending on strength of leadership, we want to phase in appropriately, and so that might look like expanding down to third grade, and it might make more sense to add $\mathrm{K}-1$ and build back up.

I don't have that full plan yet, because I don't have the leader hired yet, but we do know that over the next two to three years we want to make sure we renovate that building and add $\mathrm{K}-3$ so we can complete the elementary model. Does that give you enough clarity?

DR. SAUNDERS: I think so.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Other questions?
DR. SAUNDERS: I did have one more.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Go ahead, Dr. Saunders.
DR. SAUNDERS: Just curious, do you know the retention rate. I don't know mean "retention" in the form that we use it, but how many of your students, after their first year of enrollment, come back the second year?

Tiffanie N. Harrison, CCR

MR. SHIREY: Typically, we have across the network 85 percent of students returning. When you take out students who moved away from the community, we usually cut that in about half, by a third. So, in other words, over 90 percent of the students who were with us, and continue to live in the area, choose to return to KIPP Delta in the subsequent year.

Blytheville, a year ago, had numbers that were well below our KIPP Delta average. It's something we worked incredibly hard on this year, and our attrition rates were significantly cut in Blytheville. The high-water mark for us is our elementary school in Helena, which at the end of the year, we had a 2.9 percent attrition, which is pretty low. And so, there's a lot we can learn and bring that to Blytheville.

DR. SAUNDERS: And I do want to point out, looking at your student performance numbers, it looks like you're doing a great job, and I just want to commend you on that?

MR. SHIREY: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Ms. Davis, do you have any issues to bring before us? Any additional questions? I will now accept a motion. Dr. Saunders, do you
have more questions? You want to discuss? DR. SAUNDERS: I guess I'm just a little uneasy on how the roll out -- on the expansion, how it will look. It doesn't include the -- when it will be. MR. SHIREY: If I can suggest, I would be comfortable with an imposed deadline to say if we can get -- or maybe if we can get permission to go K-3 with the notification of how we're going to phase that in, to be delivered in a -- you know, to the Blytheville School District by whatever it is, March 31st, whatever is a reasonable time period. We can put that in writing, because it is important and we want to make sure we're -- and I think this is why this process exists, that we're fair and transparent, and they have time to plan as well.

The other thing I want to point out, we've done a lot of demographic studies on this. So, when we increase our cap from 810 to 1,110 , when we look at kids in Mississippi County, and we run buses across the area, there's a student population of about 5,000 students. It's larger than the Helena communities and Forrest City communities. So, that 1,110 would just put us over about 20 percent of students, and we think that's pretty reasonable.

We believe in choice, and we want to make sure
that the school districts obviously have the opportunity to perform. We're not trying to monopolize anything, just provide a choice. So, that total enrollment count would just be about 20 percent of the area.

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: When do you begin your application process?

MR. SHIREY: We typically will start recruiting in January. We have our lottery in April. CHAIRMAN COFFMAN: So, by sometime in early March or mid March, you would kind of have an idea of how many students would be applying?

MR. SHIRY: Yes. We could send a letter and say it looks like -- I mean, I can imagine one or two scenarios, because the way that we're structured, we have a lot of requests for third grade, so it might be the most logical thing that our school, our 4-6 school is great. They've got a bigger capacity, let's roll them down to three. We notify Blytheville School District by March we're adding third grade, as we phase into $\mathrm{K}-3$.

It might also make sense that we found an incredible elementary leader, who has the right background, who's been trained over the course of the year with us, and we want to go $\mathrm{K}-1$, and roll up.

Again, we would notify the Blytheville School District, and say we're including $\mathrm{K}-1$, and opening K 1 this year. Again, flexibility on how we get there. I think it's important to let them know we plan to go K-3, and just communicate transparently how we will phase-in.

DR. SAUNDERS: So, just to clarify, so a notification will be given to the local district by st March 31 ?

MR. SHIREY: Yeah, and I'd like to put the parameters in writing, so that it'd help the accountability on that, so it's not just my word. As Ms. Davis said, make sure we put that as part of the agreement.

CHAIRMAN COFFMAN: So, as a superintendent, if you were to get that letter by March 31st that indicated the potential number of students --

MR. SHIREY: And grades.
CHAIRMAN COFFMAN: -- and grades, then that would help you to make staffing decisions within the timeline?

MR. SHIREY: (Non-verbal response in the affirmative.)

CHAIRMAN COFFMAN: Any other questions for clarification? Mr. Rogers?

MR. ROGERS: Is there an expiration time for the tax credits that you are applying for. Are they set to expire?

MR. SHIREY: Yes. I don't have that specific date, but I think we were trying to -- do you know the date of -- before the end of the calendar year.

MR. ROGERS: Which is why you're --
MR. SHIREY: Which is why we're here. Which is why we had to do this request off schedule.

CHAIRMAN COFFMAN: Ms. Davis?
MS. DAVIS: So, I have that notification by March 31st to the Blytheville School District. I'd also request that that notification be sent to the Charter Office as well, so that way we are aware of that plan. And I think there was a confusion. It was mentioned an enrollment cap of 1,110 , but their paperwork had requested 1,100 , so a difference of 10 students. I just want to make sure we're clear on which number it is.

MR. SHIREY: What is in the official --
MS. DAVIS: Eleven hundred.
MR. SHIREY: Eleven hundred is fine.
MS. SMITH: Okay. So, when I'm looking at some of the documentation, I'm looking at it as a school district and then as an individual school. So,

Forrest City, what grades does Forrest City currently have?

MR. SHIREY: Forrest City would be serving grades 5-7 this year. We have authorization to go to 5-8. MS. SMITH: Okay. Then, KIPP Delta College Prep, that's K-12?

MR. SHIREY: We'll fall Pre-K through 12. We actually serve about 22 percent of Phillips and Lee County when combined. We're doing all of the demographic analysis for each community we serve, so we can be thoughtful in our planning.

MS. SMITH: Okay. And so, I guess I'm looking at the information here. So, your maximum enrollment for KIPP Delta Public Schools total is 2,310. Is that all three schools combined?

MR. SHIREY: That's all three communities combined.

MS. SMITH: Three combined, okay. And so, we're asking specifically for the Blytheville one to add 200 additional spots?

MR. SHIREY From 810 to 1100.
MS. SMITH: And so, that would then put the max enrollment -- so we would be adding an additional 200 spots to this 2310 as well, correct? I mean, I'm just making -- I'm following.

MR. SHIREY: Yeah, let's do 290 spots, from the 810 to the 1100 for the Blytheville Community, which would increase of the overall --

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: TO 2600?
MR. SHIREY: Yes.
MS. SMITH: Okay. All right. Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Any other questions? I'll accept a motion when you're ready.

DR. SAUNDERS: I'd like to make a motion to approve.

MR. ROGERS: Second.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Motion has been made by Dr . Saunders, seconded by Mr. Rogers to approve the amendment request for KIPP Delta Public Schools. Any discussion? All those in favor?

PANEL MEMBERS (Collectively) Aye.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Any opposed? Motion passes. Congratulations.

MR. SHIREY: Thank you-all. Have a great day. CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: If you will wait just a moment, each member will respond. They have to put it in writing about their decision, and then they'll read those responses to you.

MR. SHIREY: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Dr. Pfeffer?

DR. PFEFFER: I voted in favor of the motion. I have no concerns of their planned expansion with appropriate funding.

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Mr. Rogers?
MR. ROGERS: I voted for it. I thought it was a good opportunity to take advantage of the tax credits before they expire to allow -- to offer additional choices to students.

CHAIRMAN COFFMAN: Dr. Saunders?
DR. SAUNDERS: I voted in favor, and I don't have any concerns.

CHAIRMAN COFFMAN: And Ms. Smith?
MS. SMITH: I voted for; no concerns.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Thank you, Mr. Shirey.
MR. SHIREY: Thank you-all.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Are we ready to move on?
A-2: REQUEST FOR OPEN ENROLLMENT CHARTER SCHOOL AMENDMENT: THE EXCEL CENTER

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Ms. Perry, action item number 2, Request for Open Enrollment Charter School Amendment for the Excel Center.

MS. PERRY: Yes, ma'am. It's been brought to my attention that there is no amendment request for the Excel Center, but Mr. Brian Marsh, the interim President and CEO, would like to come and address the
panel to give an update on their status.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Okay. Ms. Davis, if this is just a discussion, then no need to swear in, or -MS. DAVIS: Yeah, that would be correct. CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: And our timelines are -MS. DAVIS: Right. So, I mean, if you decide at some point to take action on it, then no, but if you're not taking any action, because they're not requesting it, then you're good.

CHAIRPESON COFFMAN: All right. Good morning, Mr. Marsh. If you will state your name and title for the record.

MR. MARSH: Brian Marsh, interim president and CEO of Goodwill Industries of Arkansas. Good morning, Madam Chair, and esteemed members of the panel. I would like to update the panel on the progress towards the adult high school known as the Excel Center and Goodwill.

We are currently -- have been working through the construction of the classroom area that will be completed in August. We have hired three of the 12 members of the staff. We have identified three additional members that we anticipate offering positions within the next 10 days. We do have the need for a director. Our director has resigned, and
we are in the process of interviewing and hiring another director.

We are on track for opening, and excited with both our training and our engagement of our board, the school board, and the Goodwill board, and we just wanted to make ourselves -- avail ourselves for any questions or concerns, so that we can ensure that the panel understands where we are, and how things are progressing.

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Panel, any questions?
MS. SMITH: Just a comment. I'm actually looking forward to this actually being off the ground. When we think about charters and what they should be, they should be innovative, they should be different, and this is. And it's also meeting a population in our state that we currently do not meet their needs, and if we're going to look at taking people that have dropped out, or for whatever reason haven't been successful in the actual $\mathrm{K}-12$ system, once they're over 21, and they're looking for that degree, that's a high school degree, I think this is something that can make a difference for a lot of families in Arkansas. So, I'm looking forward to actually seeing this come to fruition.

MR. MARSH: We're very excited. We've had 130
individuals express interest, and 44 already completed applications.

CHAIRMAN COFFMAN: That's excellent.
MS. SMITH: Well, and I again want to note that this is not taking away funding from public school funds in any way, because they are -- have the grant backing, and so I think this is a great opportunity.

MR. MARSH: Our Goodwill board has pledged support for the three years that our charter is active, and in support, they've pledged over a million and a quarter a year to support the school. CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Excellent. Dr. Saunders? DR. SAUNDERS: I want to muddy the waters just a little bit here, just for an explanation. So, I met with them this morning concerning the possible amendment on the school year dates, and it's -- it kind of ran into some issues, and it was not that a student cannot enroll after a certain time. It would not inhibit that, but issue with trying to start a, if you would, a reporting cycle after other reporting cycles have -- for example, we still need to collect cycle one. We still need to collect cycle two.

For federal and state reasons, at those times, by those deadlines. So, you know, there's not a mechanism in place to be able to say October 1
numbers -- to report October 1 numbers in December, as the simple version.

And so, we discussed what the issues were, so basically, the idea was -- didn't necessarily need that waiver, but we continue to do all the reporting requirements that we have, and report them as they are throughout the year, on the different cycle reports. So, whatever that case may be. And it's really a first-year thing, but it -- that way it did not stop them from being able to move forward.

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Thank you. Dr. Pfeffer? DR. PFEFFER: And what's your planned opening date?

MR. MARSH: Planned opening date is October 16th, classes start.

DR. PFEFFER: Okay. We look forward to visiting when we have opportunities.

MR. MARSH: Excellent. You're all welcomed to come up and visit the facility, and we'd love to take you on a tour.

DR. SAUNDERS: I want to see it.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: We accept.
MR. MARSH: Wonderful.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: I think as you heard, we're all very excited. As with any school, or school
district, in our state, if you need us, we're right here. Feel free to call us, any of us. We're more than happy to serve, support, in any way that we can, so that you're successful.

MR. MARSH: Wonderful. We have a very good working relationship with Ms. Boyd, and her department, and feel very comfortable in moving forward. So, no issues.

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Thank you.
MR. MARSH: Thank you.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Thank you for coming today. We appreciate having that update. Ms. Boyd?

MS. BOYD: That's all we have for today, Madam Chair.

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Is there any other issue before us today, Ms. Davis?

MS. DAVIS: (Non-verbal response in the negative.)

CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Panel members do you have anything else? I'll accept a motion to adjourn.

DR. SAUNDERS: So moved.
DR. PFEFFER: Second.
CHAIRPERSON COFFMAN: Motion made by Dr. Saunders, seconded by Dr. Pfeffer. All those in favor?
