1	DR. HERNANDEZ: We will have Mr. Poore should
2	be either on the line or calling in. Kind of the
3	approach I sent you a link to the presentations
4	slide and basically just wanted to start out with
5	I think our first one is
6	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Let me interrupt you just a
7	second
8	DR. HERNANDEZ: Okay.
9	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Dr. Hernandez. Someone is on
10	the phone and I don't know why we're getting feedback
11	of music in the auditorium. Dan, can
12	MR. DAN DAVIS: I'll check and see if Poore was
13	on there, but nobody is there now; that's why it's
14	playing music.
15	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Okay. No one is on the
16	line at this point.
17	A-7: CONSIDERATION OF LEGISLATIVE REPORT: DOLLARWAY SCHOOL
18	DISTRICT
19	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: But we're starting with
20	Dollarway. Proceed, Dr. Hernandez. I apologize for
21	interrupting.
22	DR. HERNANDEZ: No problem. Just wanted to see
23	you know, obviously the face of what we were doing
24	in schools and how we are approaching that has
25	drastically changed. But I just wanted based on

the presentation or any items in the slide, was there any questions related to the Dollarway report or any questions about Dollarway in general?

CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Do any of the members have questions with regard to Dollarway?

MS. NEWTON: I have just a quick question.

CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Ms. Newton.

MS. NEWTON: When we're looking at the exit criteria for Dollarway, where are we in that as far as what's been met and what else do we need to get done?

DR. HERNANDEZ: So we were working very diligently in a lot of the qualitative measures. You know, obviously, with the modification in what we're looking at with testing and not being able to do testing this year that does put a big curveball in how we address that. So obviously one of the main parts of the qualitative — having the schools with no F letter grades — you know, we were encouraged by some of the interim data within Dollarway that was showing some very good upward trends from fall to winter, but just not having that test is not going to give us information. And so just like with the other — Pine Bluff and with Little Rock, we're going to have to look back at those and figure out what a path

1	forward may be in terms of looking at any revisions
2	that may need to happen to the exit criteria.
3	MS. NEWTON: So since we're not going to have
4	testing and their deadline, if I'm not mistaken,
5	is December; is that correct?
6	DR. HERNANDEZ: Their five-year mark will be in
7	December. Yes, ma'am.
8	MS. NEWTON: So what would we just completely
9	and I don't know if that would be even fair to the
10	school district to completely revise the exit
11	criteria. So what are some thoughts that maybe y'all
12	have given in that direction?
13	(COURT REPORTER'S NOTE: Dr. Hernandez is
14	speaking but without sound.)
15	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Dr. Hernandez, you're on mute.
16	DR. HERNANDEZ: Oh. I was asking if Secretary
17	Key wanted to chime in on that. I know we're having
18	some of those discussions right now.
19	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Secretary Key.
20	SECRETARY KEY: Yeah. I mean, obviously, you
21	know, we are trying to figure out what with
22	respect to the academics what we would be looking at.
23	But I would remind everyone that we also Dollarway
24	is also a district that was under fiscal distress.
25	So, you know, considering the situation that we're in

now we're also weighing the risk to the fiscal integrity of the districts that have -- because of all districts experiencing the Covid-19 health emergency.

So there are a lot of things that we just don't have answers for right now, Ms. Newton. I think the focus when we can get back to onsite instruction is to make sure that we continue with those qualitative measures that Dr. Hernandez mentioned. The issue with testing is something that -- because we have statutory requirements there, the letter grades, all of those things that right now we don't have, there's no authority to really address those because the emergency authority that we have only lasts through the 17th of April. So any waivers or anything that we would consider are going to have to be considered over a longer period of time, and we know that that is -- that is going to play into the five-year -- December 2020 five-year deadline, if you will, for Dollarway.

So we're looking at all that and we hope to be able to bring you back better recommendations than what we could have for you right now. And hopefully we'll have those for you by next month, because we know that there are a lot of things kind of in

25

suspension right now waiting on what we're going to do, not just for Dollarway but for some of the other districts.

CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Has there been any thought given to -- since all of those districts we have either through ACT or NWEA tests that they did in the fall and that they did again in December or January -- to have that as a point of comparison if they give the same type of evaluation this coming fall and December? It may not be something that we can do because it's not the Aspire, but it is something that will give the Board some -- and the Department some level of confidence about what is -- what kind of progress is being made in what areas and what kind of data we need to provide to the districts for progress beyond that.

SECRETARY KEY: Yeah, that is something that I think is a possibility. It's not a possibility for using under the letter grade system because to do that I mean you're -- the way we did the letter grades is taking into account the ESSA School Index. We created those ranges for the letter grades based on the whole state. But I think for our individual districts that have some type of -- you know, not everybody does NWEA all the way through 8th grade; so

we would have to look to see what data elements are there that could be presented or could be analyzed in a way that gives some certainty, some level of consistency. So that is an option that we could look at and have talked about how we might look at that. We just don't have any hard evidence right now for you.

CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Right. And I think as an educator it would be helpful to me to know where my kids are compared to where they were and all of those kinds of things.

Okay. Ms. Newton, did you have any other questions?

MS. NEWTON: Yeah, just on that particular thing, you know, we've got to really be careful, you know, trying to do a fall-to-fall comparison because, you know, as a teacher I would -- you know, I would be having a nervous breakdown right now if you said that you were going to come back next fall and test my kids to see -- and compare to what they were last fall. Because, you know, I've got some kids that are doing a great job -- I'm just speaking in general -- I would have some kids that would be doing a great job with AMI and that would be working very diligently on every assignment, but there's going to

be some kids that are not; they don't have parents at home that are encouraging it and are helping. And so that fall-to-fall comparison would be very scary to me because we're thinking -- you know, there's a whole nine weeks here that, you know, kids are not in the classroom, and then you go that summer where, you know, we think about the summer slide; and so that fall-to-fall comparison just would be scary as a teacher to me.

CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Yeah. I wasn't thinking of it as a predictor; I was thinking of it as a teacher who might teach 4th grade English, and typically she might start at X-point but then she realizes all that went on the year before. So, if she had some information to see did they go ahead and make the growth because, you know, of the involvement or did they fail to so she would know how to modify the lessons that she typically would teach from one August/September to the following August/September, so she could monitor and adjust her sequence of standards teaching.

MS. NEWTON: And that kind of data would be useful. But as far as looking at it school-wide and, you know, trying to judge a school I just don't think we need to go there, so --

CHAIRMAN ZOOK: I agree with you completely. 1 2 Is that -- okay. Any other questions from the Board before we go 3 on with Dr. Hernandez's report? 4 5 DR. MOORE: Yes. And maybe this is in the 6 report. CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Dr. Moore. 7 8 DR. MOORE: But I wanted to ask what their AMI days were looking like and if the District is 10 considering any summer learning programs or extended 11 summer opportunities, as we know that, you know, even 12 in a normal school year summer (inaudible) right how. 13 DR. HERNANDEZ: So it isn't in the actual 14 report, because this was the report for March which was the previous three months. What we intend to do 15 is come back in June and report out what that process 16 17 looked like for AMI. We've been working with all the 18 districts. I don't want you to think work hasn't --19 has stopped with them. We've actually been reviewing 20 their AMI plans, asking some more questions, and 21 trying to address several of the needs that are out 22 there as it relates to, in some cases, technology. 23 You know, you have kind of a mixed group of teachers 24 and administrators that are really concerned about 25 standards and being able to stick to what normal

school looks like in this out-of-school sense. 1 you know, the reality is is that that's not real 2 possible in these settings where we have students 3 that may not have access to technology at home; they may not have access to parents on a regular basis to 5 support the learning. So we're moving them to more 6 of an enrichment and trying to look at past skills that have been taught and moving away from actually 8 9 having parents, as much as possible, trying to 10 deliver new content. But we should have a pretty 11 definitive report. And part of the questions we are 12 asking is related to summer school and then also looking at their school-level plans on how those 13 14 would be updated, given that they're not going to 15 have data. So the conversation about fall-to-fall, 16 what will that data be able to tell us or tell the 17 teachers in terms of how they might need to deal with 18 skills when they come back to school. 19 CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Anything --20 DR. MOORE: Thank you. I know y'all are all 21 working so hard in these times. So thank you. 22 CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Anyone else on Dollarway? 23 Okay. I guess the only questions I have is --24 or the only two questions I have is where are they 25 with regard to the dyslexia audit?

DR. HERNANDEZ: So, they did have their dyslexia review and in the -- inside the document is their plan of how they're addressing those deficiencies and kind of where they are on the status of those. You know, when we stopped school, you know, the kind of -- the service that was being provided was slow in Dollarway, but it started to pick up steam and more students are starting to receive services. But I'll be honest, a lot of that stalled as -- you know, having -- as they're trying to transition. But that's some of the questions that we've posed to the districts and they've replied back how they're trying to address the students and their special ed. needs, their dyslexia needs, and things like that as well.

CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Okay. And the other question I had -- I know that they were one of the districts that did not do AMI days initially. And I wondered if they were up-to-speed on that for the students now that we are not going to have school till next year?

DR. HERNANDEZ: So during those days that they were initially out, there was a total of six they did not have AMI and they will have to make those days up. But during that time they prepared development of AMI packets and plans and are now -- actually have a pretty reasonable plan that they're trying to work

through now with their students. So they are up-tospeed on their AMI process, but they weren't. And,
you know, I tend to agree with Ms. Warren in some of
the decisions in not having AMI developed because,
you know, she would rather make those days up. And
not foreseeing that this situation would happen -because she knows that when students are at home
they're not getting the same, you know, access and
support that they are when they're at school. So
that was the reasoning behind not doing AMI in the
first place. But they have since developed a process
that they're working through.

CHAIRMAN ZOOK: And were -- was Dollarway able -- I know we mentioned fiscal distress before. Was Dollarway able to provide Chromebooks for their students and for the ones who did not have Wi-Fi or internet access? Did they provide them any thumbdrives or packets?

DR. HERNANDEZ: They are providing devices and also packets. They are working in the community to identify providers for internet access. You know, they're probably -- you know, when you look at Earle or Marianna they're a lot better off with providers and able to get students access. And surprisingly what's been found in Pine Bluff and Dollarway, there

1	are a lot of students that do have access to internet
2	at home or via through their parents' mobile phones
3	and making those in the hotspots and things like
4	that. And so they're continuing to try to provide
5	fill in those gaps for students.
6	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Anyone else have questions?
7	Do I have a motion?
8	MS. NEWTON: Move to accept the report.
9	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Moved by Ms. Newton to accept
10	the report.
11	Do I have a second?
12	MS. DEAN: Second.
13	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Second by Ms. Dean.
14	All in favor?
15	(UNANIMOUS CHORUS OF AYES)
16	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Opposed?
17	Motion passes.
18	A-8: CONSIDERATION OF LEGISLATIVE REPORT: PINE BLUFF SCHOOL
19	DISTRICT
20	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Next is Pine Bluff. And is Dr.
21	Owoh or anyone from Pine Bluff on the line?
22	DR. HERNANDEZ: They are not. They're actually
23	distributing food and doing dropping leaving
24	regalia out for seniors right now.
25	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Okay. Well, we've got to

1 satisfy their basic needs, so --2 DR. HERNANDEZ: Yes, ma'am. CHAIRMAN ZOOK: -- if you will. 3 4 Did you have a video presentation that you wanted us to see on Dollarway? 5 DR. HERNANDEZ: I sent you the link, but I'll 6 7 just -- it's in the chat box. CHAIRMAN ZOOK: 8 Right. 9 DR. HERNANDEZ: And so I think just the same thing with Dollarway, are there any -- has there been 10 11 any questions on the report or any specific questions 12 about Pine Bluff? 13 MS. NEWTON: My question was from last month. 14 One of the things I was concerned about last month 15 was the graduation rate that they've had in the past. 16 How is -- not having face-to-face instruction, how is 17 that going to affect their graduation for seniors 18 this year, the number of expected graduates? have plans for those that were close but needed some 19 20 extra help? What's going on with that? 21 DR. HERNANDEZ: So with their seniors they do 22 You know, they were on track to do have plans. 23 better in terms of supporting their students with 24 graduation this year. Obviously, this has caused 25 some problems with that. But they actually, you

know, are working with seniors that are on track to 1 They will go graduate as of the third nine weeks. 2 ahead with moving those students on, still providing 3 the support as needed. But students that weren't on 4 track and needed credit recovery, that will extend 5 all the way through the summer in allowing them to 6 7 continue. A lot of those students are still sticking 8 to their same schedules, and so they have access to 9 online platforms and things like that that are 10 helping them continue their work. 11 MS. NEWTON: Thank you. 12 DR. HERNANDEZ: And they do have Chromebooks with internet access. All the seniors have access to 13 14 that. 15 CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Any other board member with a 16 question about Pine Bluff? On -- under the exit criteria link on 17 18 page 8, what does "decodable texts had been ordered 19 but have not had access" -- what does that mean? 20 Back to that question -- so what DR. HERNANDEZ: 21 was the question again? I'm sorry. 22 CHAIRMAN ZOOK: I wondered what the statement 23 "decodable texts had been ordered but not have access" -- what does that mean? 24 25 DR. HERNANDEZ: So what I understood from our

review is that their decodable texts had been ordered 1 and were in the process of coming in, but some of the 2 reports that we are getting is that the teachers 3 didn't have full access. But we know now that that 4 has since been corrected. 5 Thank you. CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Okay. 6 7 And I noticed Pine Bluff High School was the only school in the District that had met their growth 8 9 goals, so they're to be commended for that, everyone 10 who's working on that. 11 I also see it written a lot of PD training, but 12 not much mention of how it's being implemented and whether they're doing one-size-fits-all as opposed to 13 individualizing, like we encourage teachers to do for 14 15 students. Can you speak to that? 16 DR. HERNANDEZ: You know, a lot of the 17 professional development is guided by the PLC process 18 with Solution Tree. 19 CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Yes. 20 DR. HERNANDEZ: So there are a lot of cases 21 where there is a lot of whole-group instruction, 22 especially this being the first year of 23 So that -- I think that will kind of implementation. 24 move towards what we've seen in Dollarway; a lot of

that PD moves to the different kinds of PLC teams

where it's not necessarily individualized but it's more individualized for that group, whether it be a literacy or a math group, and kind of moves more towards smaller individualized group trainings.

CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Okay. I know Dr. Wilde used to be very concerned that we tried -- when districts had needs it wasn't like a need or two needs, and so sometimes rather than getting focused or prioritizing we tried to do too much at once. Do you think that is the case in Pine Bluff or Dollarway?

You know, I don't, when it comes DR. HERNANDEZ: What I think, you know, becomes to the PLC process. problematic in some of these districts is that we -when districts that have notoriously not been compliant with all the different laws that are out there and trying to do all those things, just to meet the bare minimum of compliance, it can be overwhelming. And so we have schools that were behind in their implementation of the dyslexia laws, that weren't doing special ed. correctly, you know, struggle with, you know, the implementation of the new Right to Read act and things like that; that when you put all those things together, you know, it can be -- but we've tried to be very diligent in planning and tried to, you know, provide support and make sure

1	that districts are still continuing to show
2	improvement in these areas and make sure that it's
3	timed-out right. But it can be you know, when you
4	first take over you've got a very short window to
5	make change, and so that trying to get all those
6	things going in the right direction does sometimes
7	put a lot of stress on districts.
8	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Any other comments from other
9	board members?
10	Do I have a motion to approve the report on Pine
11	Bluff?
12	MS. McFETRIDGE: I'll make that motion to
13	approve the report on Pine Bluff. This is Kathy.
14	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Moved by Ms. McFetridge.

23	A-9: CONSIDERATION OF LEGISLATIVE REPORT: LITTLE ROCK SCHOOL
24	DISTRICT
25	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Okay. Little Rock.

1	Dan, would you check to see if Mr. Poore is on
2	the line?
3	Okay.
4	MR. POORE: I am on the line. This is Mike
5	Poore.
6	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Dr. Hernandez, you may proceed.
7	DR. HERNANDEZ: So Mr. Poore is on the line; is
8	that correct?
9	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Yes.
10	DR. HERNANDEZ: Okay, good. So
11	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Somebody is on the line. We
12	don't know who.
13	DR. HERNANDEZ: Yeah, he should be. He texted
14	me, said that he was trying to turn off the webcast
15	because it was delayed.
16	So with Little Rock as well, you know, kind of
17	in the same boat with Pine Bluff and Dollarway in
18	terms of exit criteria, we are in the process of
19	meeting with the District; because in the rules it
20	talks about development of that thing with the
21	District, and so we're having those kinds of
22	conversations. And obviously, you know, we've kind
23	of hit an odd thing with not being able to test this
24	year, and so that's kind of had us to thinking, just
25	like around Dollarway and some of the other

1 districts, how we want to think about modification and look at exit criteria possibly a little bit 2 differently. And so we actually will have some of 3 those conversations in the coming weeks in trying to develop working plans for the remainder of this year 5 and the summer and going into next year with the 6 7 District. 8 But as far as the report goes, are there any 9 specific questions about the report? 10 CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Do I have comments or questions 11 from any board members on the Little Rock School 12 District legislative report? 13 DR. MOORE: Yes, I have a question. 14 I see there's a huge difference in the informal 15 TESS observations, going from 4,000 to 11,000. does that look like? What did that look like this 16 17 past fall in the school? 18 DR. HERNANDEZ: So --19 CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Did you understand the question, 20 Dr. Hernandez? 21 DR. HERNANDEZ: Yeah. So in terms of the 22 numbers going up, you know, I think it's just a 23 reflection of having the local team and the District 24 putting emphasis on those, you know, classroom walk-25 thru's and informals and things like that.

think they've really hit their stride in making that a point of emphasis with the District, and so, you know, getting things into the system and getting the quality up. My understanding from our principal supports, Rocci and Brent, that have been working with principals there in the District, along with Sheila, you know, we've really been pretty happy with the progress that's being made in terms of getting in the classrooms and trying to support teacher practice.

DR. MOORE: Do y'all have any understanding as to what that feedback looks like, if it's meaningful, if it's just checking boxes?

DR. HERNANDEZ: So based on our discussions is that that -- the feedback is getting a lot better than it was in previous years, that it's not just a time to get in the class -- the time, the amounts that they're staying in the classrooms, and being able to provide feedback through the EdReflect system. If you go back to, you know, previous years, there were even certain administrators that weren't necessarily even in the system to provide feedback. And so getting everybody where that's just a part of their normal operations has been -- there's been a significant difference this year.

1 DR. MOORE: Thank you. Any other board member have a 2 CHAIRMAN ZOOK: 3 question or a comment? 4 MS. McFETRIDGE: Yes, I do, Ms. Zook. Okay, Ms. McFetridge. 5 CHAIRMAN ZOOK: MS. McFETRIDGE: I know Little Rock has done an 6 7 amazing job working with Solution Tree in PLCs. 8 just curious, have the teachers been able to keep up 9 at all in PLCs as they're putting together their AMI 10 plans? Does that make sense? 11 CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Uh-huh. 12 DR. HERNANDEZ: Yeah, it does. So I know Mr. 13 Poore is on the line. I know that not -- they're 14 doing some trainings and have been involved. 15 not exactly doing the embedded coaching that the 16 districts are -- that the other districts are. 17 They're going to be moving to more of that model next 18 But as far as actual PLCs, you know, still 19 getting to meet, that may be a good question for Mr. 20 I know the principals are really trying to Poore. 21 support the teachers during this time, but as far as 22 them being able to formally meet for PLCs --23 MS. McFETRIDGE: Well, I didn't know if there was a way for the teachers to use Zoom where they 24 25 can, you know, work together or what.

DR. HERNANDEZ: I will say that, you know, not

specific to Little Rock, but in Pine Bluff and

Dollarway that have been working solely with them,

they have been continuing to have virtual meetings

and things like that, trying to continue keeping

those teams together and discussing.

MS. McFETRIDGE: Okay. Good. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Mr. Poore, did you have anything you wanted to add to that?

SUPT. POORE: I will -- and thank you for the question, Ms. McFetridge. I think Mike handled it But one thing I'll tell you is just as pretty well. we moved into our Phase 2 of our AMI it's been a big adjustment for both students, parents, and staff, and so we're learning a lot. We're -- our goal is to get better every day, and one of those components is to have our teachers work together. And we actually have some of our specialists and some of our elective teachers that will start to push into a new collaborative of trying to help and support learners through our platform delivery. You know, it's going to take a little bit different shape, to be honest with you, over the next two months in terms of just trying to make sure we're wrapped around to provide the support to the families and the students in a

1	different way. I hope that addresses the answer
2	or the question. Excuse me.
3	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Does anyone else have any
4	questions or statements?
5	MS. McFETRIDGE: Could we have Dr. Hernandez
6	repeat what Mr. Poore said? I really
7	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Sure.
8	MS. McFETRIDGE: couldn't hear him. Just
9	summarize it maybe.
10	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: It's easier to hear Dr.
11	Hernandez than it was Mr. Poore, because Mr. Poore is
12	on the phone and Dr. Hernandez is on Zoom. So, Dr.
13	Hernandez?
14	DR. HERNANDEZ: And I think I heard the same
15	thing you guys did, so I don't know that I can repeat
16	what he said.
17	MS. McFETRIDGE: Okay.
18	MS. NEWTON: Ms. Zook and he may have said
19	this and I couldn't hear Mr. Poore at all but I'm
20	getting a lot of emails from parents concerned about
21	the level of intensity of the AMI that they're doing,
22	the number of hours that they're having to spend on
23	it. Could someone describe to me what they're doing
24	for AMI and how flexible they're being with students
25	and parents? I know it's a stressful time for

1	parents. And so can someone describe to me and it
2	may not can be Mr. Poore, because I can't hear him at
3	all
4	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Okay.
5	MS. NEWTON: what they're doing for AMI and
6	what they're doing to work with parents?
7	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Are you addressing this
8	specifically to Little Rock or to districts in
9	general?
10	MS. NEWTON: Specifically to Little Rock.
11	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Okay. Mr Dr. Hernandez, see
12	if you can hear what Mr. Poore says and then we'll
13	try to get the answer.
14	SUPT. POORE: I'm speaking as loudly
15	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Mr. Poore, did you hear the
16	question?
17	SUPT. POORE: as I possibly can. Can anybody
18	hear me at all?
19	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Get as close as you can and talk
20	as loud as possible.
21	SUPT. POORE: Yeah, I'm shouting right now, Ms.
22	Zook. So I've got the whole my whole front office
23	wondering what's going on in here. Can you hear me
24	at all?
25	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Yes, I can.

SUPT. POORE: Okay. One thing about AMI -- and 1 I don't think Little Rock is unique in this -- in 2 that some parents are saying we're doing too much, 3 others are saying we're not doing enough. We -- this 4 week was our first week to go into virtual platforms 5 for both elementary and secondary. We also have 6 7 expectations of how staff will interact with parents 8 and try to be a support to them. We also are trying to create extreme flexibility on attendance and 9 grading. But the systems do allow us to monitor so 10 11 that we know who's involved, whether a teacher is 12 being involved or whether a student is being 13 involved, and that will shape then how we can go back 14 and create additional support to anybody that's not, 15 you know, participating. We did deploy probably 16 about 8,000 devices so that all the families can be 17 taken care of with virtual learning and have come up 18 with good plans so far, that I can tell, on getting 19 family data. 20 CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Were you able to hear any of 21 that, Ms. Newton and other board members? 22 MS. NEWTON: No, not really. Could you 23 summarize maybe? 24 CHAIRMAN ZOOK: I can. 25 SECRETARY KEY: Let me try this.

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This is our first week into SUPT. POORE: Yes. our Phase 2 delivery for AMI instruction. That began this week with us deploying basically about 8,000 devices out to families. We also feel pretty good about where we're at with data plans. The good thing about the platforms that we're using in terms of an online platform is that allows us to create a uniform delivery of instruction for all learners and we can actually monitor who has got on the system and who hasn't, so that we'll be able to follow up next week even with direct calls to families to see, you know, why they haven't gone on to the online platform and if they're not getting on, what do we need to do to support them, if they're having technical difficulties or still don't have a device. had parents voice frustration but also are saying that they really like what's happening; so you get kind of a mix. We have some parents saying we're doing too much, others saying we're not doing enough. In talking to superintendents throughout the state on our Zoom conferences, I think many of my colleagues are experiencing the same things. We are trying to make sure we create a flexible approach and environment right now on grading, as well as

1	attendance, and we're trying to work on our messaging
2	on that over the course of this week so that both
3	staff and parents know that we've just got to keep
4	working at it and keep getting better. I hope that
5	gives a good overview. I could go into more depth,
6	but hopefully that gives a snapshot.
7	MS. NEWTON: Very helpful. Thank you. You
8	know, I get emails but I don't always see the big
9	picture; so that was helpful. Thank you.
10	CHAIRMAN ZOOK: Anyone else have questions while
