

## Hoxie Integration Lesson Plan

<b>Lesson Title:</b>	<b>What Photographs Can Tell Us</b>
<b>Estimated Time (Class Period/s):</b>	1 - 40 minute class period
<b>Grade Level(s):</b>	Grades 7 - 12

<b>Learning Objective(s):</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. To view, analyze and interpret photographs dealing with the personal experiences of school integration.</li> <li>2. To use discussion of past experiences to start peer-to-peer dialogue about related current issues.</li> </ol>
<b>Essential Question:</b>	Why did some Arkansas cities seem capable of dealing positively with the challenges of integrating their school district while others did not?
<b>Materials and Resources:</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. National Park Service Photo Little Rock Nine Leaving School Under US Army escort (2 versions – one with photo caption and link to photo and one with the photo only)</li> <li>2. AP Photo Integration in Fayetteville, Arkansas escort (2 versions – one with photo caption and link to photo and one with the photo only)</li> </ol>

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<b>Additional Resources and Materials Used (i.e. graphic organizer, handouts, etc.):</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. <a href="#">Teacher's guide to analyzing Photographs and Prints</a> (Library of Congress)</li><li>2. Power Pair Activity for Transcribed Oral Histories</li><li>3. Sticky notes, highlighters, pens, pencils</li></ol>
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<p><b>Lesson Plan Details</b> (Substitute Teacher Proof):</p>	<p>Class divides into groups of 4-5 participants. Each student is given a copy of Little Rock Nine photo. Using the following steps in the activity below, students will:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Look at the photograph <b>silently</b> and circle or highlight details that stand out.</li> <li>2. Take turns pointing out those details <b>without comment</b>.</li> <li>3. Next, take turns sharing personal reactions to what they see in the photograph.</li> </ol> <p>Hand out copies of the photo of Integration Fayetteville, Arkansas. Repeat the same steps with the second photo.</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>4. Look at the photograph <b>silently</b> and circle or highlight details that stand out.</li> <li>5. Take turns pointing out those details <b>without comment</b>.</li> <li>6. Next, take turns sharing personal reactions to what they see in the photograph.</li> </ol> <p>Ask students to explore how the story in the second photo affects their understanding of the first photo. Compare and contrast the point of view or differences in reactions of the persons in the photos.</p> <p>End the discussion with questions for further reflection and study. Use sticky notes to write:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Questions for the persons in the two photos,</li> <li>• Questions for the persons taking the photographs,</li> <li>• Questions for classmates</li> <li>• Questions the photographs make you ask yourself.</li> </ul> <p>Attach the sticky notes with questions to the Power Pair Chart.</p> <p>Provide additional background information concerning the events around the photographs.</p>
<p><b>Formative Assessment(s):</b></p>	<p>Exit pass:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. List one thing that you learned about integration in Arkansas that you didn't know before.</li> <li>2. What about this process help you think more deeply than you would have if you had only looked at one photograph?</li> </ol>
<p><b>Additional Notes:</b></p>	<p>This activity is based on lesson plans developed by the <i>Civil Rights Memory Project</i> at Little Rock Central High School.
