In accordance with 7 CFR 245.6a(7) allowable income source documents include written evidence such as wage stubs, award letters, letters from employers, and collateral contacts. Additionally, allowable income documentation must provide proof of current income. Current is defined as one month prior to selection notification and up until verification documents are due. B. Meal Patterns and Nutritional Quality NO Technical Assistance Corrective Action YES Meal Components and Quantities П П \checkmark Offer versus Serve Dietary Specifications and Nutrient Analysis Findings: 1) Upon observation of breakfast meal service students began exiting the point of service (POS) without a ½ cup of fruit. One (1) student exited the POS with a non-reimbursable meal prior to technical assistance being provided. Interviews with Kitchen Manager and other child nutrition staff, as well as signage requiring all students take a milk revealed a poor understanding of OVS requirements. According to 7 CFR 220.8(e) "to exercise the offer vs serve (OVS) option at breakfast, a school food authority must offer a minimum of four food items daily as part of the required components. Under OVS, students are allowed to decline one of the four food items, provided that students select at least ½ cup of the fruit component for a reimbursable meal." C. - 1) Upon observation of competitive beverages sold in school stores, the following was found:
 - One beverage, hot chocolate, exceeded calorie limits and did not meet USDA Smart Snacks requirements. In accordance with 7 CFR 210.11 (3)(vii) beverages must contain no more than 40 calories per 8 fluid ounces or 60 calories per 12 fluid ounces.
 - At the point of choice, options such as water, juice, or milk were not available for sale. In accordance with Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) Rules Governing Nutrition and Physical Activity Standards and Body Mass Index for Age Assessment Protocols in Arkansas Public Schools, at the point of choice, at least 50% of beverage selections in vending machines, school stores, and other sales venues shall be 100% fruit juice, low-fat or fat-free milk, and unflavored, unsweetened water.
 - Caffeinated beverages, including multiple options of coffee, were offered to 8th grade students. According to 7 CFR 210.11(k) and 7 CFR 210.11(m), middle school students (defined as 5th- 8th grade) are limited to plain or carbonated water, low fat flavored or unflavored milk (12 oz maximum), flavored or unflavored nonfat milk (12 oz maximum), nutritionally equivalent milk alternatives, or 100% fruit/vegetable juice and 100% fruit and or/vegetable juice diluted with water (with or without carbonation and with no added sweeteners)(12 oz maximum).
 - Nutrient information and Smart Snacks compliance documentation was not retained for any
 items sold in school stores. In accordance with 7 CFR 210.11 (b)(2), the SFA is responsible
 for maintaining documentation of compliance for all competitive food available for sale to
 students outside of reimbursable school meals.
